Nkongsamba is a green city, very quiet with lots of rain. That's why the people of Nkongsamba get up early in the morning to go and farm in the fields.

I am proud to be responsible for the cultivation of the property's fields. Unfortunately, now the land is not as fertile, so you always have to put chicken or ox manure before planting corn or vegetables to make sure you have a good harvest.

I don't work alone but with two workers who take care of the fields and livestock during the week while the novices take care of it at weekends. I am also responsible for the organization of work, wages, taxes and insurance for workers. One Sunday a month, I visit sick people in the neighborhood around the parish territory.



For the breeding of rabbits, technique and follow-up are more and more important since, among the animals, the rabbits are the most fragile and they require a lot of work, dedication and above all experience. Nevertheless, rabbits are a good financial investment since we sell a rabbit for 10,000 Cameroonian francs and buyers come to us to get them.
